

Distance Learning Assessment Strategies



Summaries

Ask your students to write you a summary of what they have learnt using anywhere between 5 and 100 words.

Virtual Whiteboard

Get your students to write their answers or ideas on a virtual whiteboard.

Learning logs

Get your students to reflect on their learning in a learning log.

Sentence prompts

Email your students reflection question stems to reply to, such as "I understand... I don't understand... I need more information about..."

Three facts and a fib

Get your students to email each other three facts and a fib about a topic. Ask to be CC'd into the email.

KWL Word Cloud

Before you start a topic, survey your students about what they already know and what they would like to learn. Collate all their ideas into a word cloud.

Celebrate Progress

Get your students to communicate to you about how they feel they have improved.

Emojis

Get your students to communicate to you how they feel about their learning using emojis, including thumbs up, facial expressions or traffic lights.

Mind Mapping

Ask your students to mind-map in real-time <u>online</u> and observe their ideas.

Online Quizzes

Create online <u>quizzes</u> to check students' understanding.

Doodle it

Have students draw what they understand instead of writing it. They could send a photo or do it online live and in real time.

Chalkboard Splash

Use an <u>online timer</u> and give students a set amount of time to respond to a prompt in a live session.

Cold call

Email students a question at random. Use a <u>random name</u> <u>picker</u> to help.

Use Online Polls

Create a poll to check students' understanding.

Twitter Board

Get your students to imagine they are tweeting about their learning. Give them 140 characters to summarise a topic or concept.

Photos

Get your students to communicate to you images that represent what they have learned, followed by a short summary explaining why they chose those images.

Teach younger kids

Get your students to communicate to you images that represent what they have learned, followed by a short summary explaining why they chose those images.

Self-assessment

Provide your students with a rubric that they can use to self assess their work.

Bump it up wall

Provide your students with photos of different levels of quality to help them reflect on where their work sits and what they can do to improve.

Correction competition

Provide your students with a sample of work that could be improved and have your students reply with an improved version.
